

THE SPIRIT SAYS...

John Loge, President

"The Spirit says that in later times some will abandon the faith and follow deceiving spirits and things taught by demons." These words from 1 Timothy 4:1 are jarring. These are the last days. The Spirit says that in these days, some will abandon the faith. There may be some prominent people who come to mind--but your neighbors and former church friends may come to mind as well. Abandoning the faith Some are former leaders, some are from your youth group. It is a marker of the last days.

The second part of the verse is equally sobering: people who have abandoned the faith are at great risk of following deceiving spirits and things taught by demons. Sound impossible?

Consider this: The leader of a national association of evangelicals (who had preached against homosexual behavior/rights) was found to be having homosexual encounters himself. He appeared in a reality TV series episode depicting a week of swapping wives with a friend of his. Several pastors have been caught in some pretty shady financial deals. Four hundred pastors and seminary professors were caught as customers of Ashley Madison.

Some will abandon the faith. They will be influenced by deceiving spirits. They will follow things taught by demonst My friends, this passage is not talking about the world--these are individuals who have been in the faith and abandon it. So, what is the church's response to this? I would suggest three fundamental things:

1. A solid understanding of the Word of God. John 17:17 says, "Sanctify them (Jesus' followers--us) by the truth--your Word is truth." It is the truth which sets us free. Truth is the antidote to false teaching. We must know it, live it, and teach it. This is why we here at NBC are so committed to teaching the next generation of church members and leaders the whole of the Scriptures. Prav that we would do so well.

2. Maintain fellowship and accountability with

other believers on an individual basis. We need to be personally held accountable for our lives. If we live solo lives (especially leaders) we run a great risk of slipping into error, both in doctrine and lifestyle. This is what we do here at NBC--each student is mentored/discipled during their time at the College. The desire is to help them grow while they are here. AND when they leave, may they have the desire to do the same for themselves and others.

3. Maintain fellowship with the wider body of Christ. There is a reason Scripture implores us not to neglect assembling together as a church (see Hebrews 10:25). When the weather is cold, we need each other. When it is hot or raining we need to assemble and worship with believers. When we are on vacation, we need to be with other Christians. Unless we are housebound, TV or internet church is a poor substitute for in-person fellowship. Online resources are great, but face-to-face worship, Bible teaching/study, and prayer are indispensable.

What will happen if we do not have a clear understanding of the Word? What will happen if we neglect the assembly and accountability? Well, we are witnessing what Paul warned us to be prepared for: an abandoning of the faith, deceiving spirits, and things taught by demons. However, this is why we are warned: First Timothy 4 goes on to say that we are to be good ministers of Christ Jesus. We are to labor and strive as we put our hope in the living God who is the Savior of those who believe. We will be faithful! Just because there are counterfeit bills does not mean we discontinue the use of cash--we learn to recognize true bills and the false are readily identified.

May it be the same with us: may we know and recognize the truth; may we enter into/continue in relationships which will cause us to grow in our faith; may we labor and strive as a part of the wider body of believers--the church--for which Christ

If we do so, we will be blessed, the church will benefit, the world will see us doing so, and our God is glorified.

I graduated in 1984 (BTh) and planned to serve in China, but the Lord closed the doors so our family spent 17 years in Simcoe, ON. While there, I was ordained by Grace Baptist Church within the Fellowship of Evangelical Baptist Churches in Canada and was introduced to chaplaincy at the Norfolk General Hospital and Nursing Home.

I served for 14 years as Pastor in Bobcaygeon, ON and became chaplain of the Royal Canadian Legion branches in Bobcaygeon and Durham, ON.
