COURSE DESCRIPTION

This class provides an introduction to the latter historical books of the Old Testament (1 Kings – Esther). These books document the spiritual decline of Israel following the kingship of David. This decline resulted in the defeat and exile of God's people. From exile, God's people turned back to him and he restored them to the land he gave them.

This class intends to highlight the long-suffering of God as he patiently deals with his rebellious people. God's abiding presence with his people, even in exile, will be seen throughout the books.

THE BIG QUESTION

What is the abiding significance of the historical books for our lives as followers of Jesus?

LEARNING OUTCOMES

The student will gain:

- 1. A growing appreciation for the spiritual value of the Old Testament.
- 2. Basic familiarity with the Old Testament books of 1 Kings Esther.
- 3. Knowledge and ability to use basic principles for interpreting 1 Kings Esther.
- 4. An understanding of how the historical books should inform their interpretation of the New Testament.
- 5. The ability to relate the message of the historical books to their own life and ministry.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

Participation in Class and Lab Activities – 5%

 The student will be engaged in class discussion and classroom practical activities throughout the course.

Bible Reading - 10%

• The student will read the entirety of 1 Kings - Esther throughout the class. During the last class period they will indicate how many chapters they read out of the 145 chapters from 1 Kings - Esther.

DUE: December 12th, 2022

Bible Memorization – 10%

• The student will memorize one passage from each of the historical books under consideration. The student will write out the passage verbatim (indicating the translation) by the beginning of the class period. The verses to be memorized are:

1 Kings 8:27
 2 Chronicles 7:13-14
 Ezra 7:10
 Nehemiah 1:5-6
 Esther 4:14

Due: December 9th

Satterthwaite and McConville Textbook Reading Comprehension Quizzes – 15%

• The student will be prepared for a quiz that corresponds to the assigned reading for the class period. All quizzes will be at the beginning of class and based on the content of *Exploring the Old Testament: A Guide to the Historical Books*.

Ulrich Textbook Reading and Report – 15%

•	After reading Now and Not Yet: Theology and Mission in Ezra-Nehemiah the				
	student will submit a 3 page report that includes: proper bibliographic information				
	of the chosen text (indicate pages read), interaction with 4-5 insights that were				
	particularly helpful ("I understand better because of this." "I can apply this				
"), interaction with 2-3 points of disagreement or clarification ("The					
	author is clearly wrong because" "I wish the author had explained				
	better because").				

DUE: October 28th, 2022

Exegetical Paper and Presentation of Findings -2 assignments: paper worth 20%, presentation worth 5% (25% total)

- The student will write a **10 page** exegetical paper consulting at least **8 sources** (including at least four commentaries) on one of the following topics:
 - Elijah's Despair (1 Kings 19:1-5. Was Elijah "afraid" or did he "see"? How does this affect the interpretation?)
 - 1 Kings 22:19-23 (What is going on with the deceiving spirit episode? Does God deceive people?)
 - Religious Intermarriage (Ezra 9-10. Parallels/differences with 1 Corinthians 7:12-20, application for today.)
 - The absence of God in Esther(?) (The student will write a paper on the fact that God is not mentioned in Esther. Why is that?)
 - A passage in Kings that has a parallel in Chronicles with significant differences. (Compare and contrast Kings and Chronicles. What themes do the different writers bring out by the material they choose to include and the material they leave out? What possible reasons could the Chronicler have had to tell the story differently?)
 - Another passage from the historical books that is approved by the professor.
- Some guidelines for this paper are as follows (headings are preferred, you can use the same main headings as below):

Basic Outline:

Introduction: .5-1 page. Have the main point of the passage italicized.

- **a. Context:** 2-3 pages (some passages may need more or less contextual consideration)
 - a. **Historical Context**: Is there a determinable historical context behind the specific passage? Does any of the historical context behind the general period of the book as a whole **help to interpret the passage**?
 - b. **Literary Context**: Why is this passage in this part of the book? Is there anything in the passage preceding my passage or the passage following my passage that **helps to interpret it**?
- **b. Content:** 5-6 pages of exegetical work through the specific passage (key terms, interpretive decisions, evaluation of competing theories, etc.).

Application: .75-1 page. Show how the main point of the passage applies to **your life or ministry** today.

- The week following the due date for the written paper, the student will then present their findings orally in class. The presentations need not be longer than **2-3 minutes** and they will answer the following questions:
 - "Why did I choose this topic?"
 - "What are some insights on this passage that I didn't know before?"
 - "What is the significance of this passage for **us** today?"

• The student will take a final exam covering the content of the course. The quizzes and memory verses will be valuable preparation.
