COURSE DESCRIPTION

Since the beginning, God has been using men and women to further His good and perfect plan to redeem a fallen humanity. He has ever been looking to find those willing to join Him in His glorious plan, and serve as His hands and feet, leading their generation towards freedom in Jesus. This class will look at this seeking Lord, and examine what He is looking for in His spiritual leaders. What are those requirements? Can a holy God use a broken person in His perfect plan? Can He use even you to lead His people? These important questions will be addressed as we dive deep into who God is, and how He works among His people.

COURSE QUESTION

What does it mean to be a leader from God's perspective, functioning in His Church and in this fallen world?

COURSE OBJECTIVES

The student will:

- 1. Understand what a leader is from God's perspective, looking into His Word to understand:
 - a. God's desire for His Church to move toward His agenda.
 - b. How God speaks to His people.
 - c. God's character expectations of a leader.
 - d. How God's leaders were shaped and formed.
 - e. The pitfalls of leadership.

- 2. Examine godly leadership through proven modern leadership examples.
- 3. Experience spiritual leadership through leading their peers in discussions, prayers, formal meetings, and class presentations.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

Daily Quizzes - 25%

• The student will demonstrate their understanding of the assigned text through a quiz that will be given at the beginning of each class, starting on the second day of class. The quiz will be taken out of the assigned textbook only, and will be based upon the major concepts found throughout the assigned reading. This quiz will be primarily true/false and multiple choice in nature, but may contain other testing tools.

Paper and Class Presentation of a Historical Christian Leader - 2 parts, one worth 15%, one worth 10% (25% total)

- Part 1 (worth 15%) The student will prepare a 6-7 page paper examining the leadership of one of the historical figures listed below. The student must have at least 6 different and approved sources, and they must be properly cited. The paper will be academic in structure. Please see rubric: Paper and Class Presentation of a Historical Christian Leader, for more details on how you will be graded. After the student's thesis statement, the student will incorporate the following paper divisions into their paper:
 - 1. Background qualifications that led to God choosing this individual as His leader.
 - 2. The main reason(s) why this leader succeeded in ministry leadership.
 - 3. Major trial/trials that the leader experienced that God used for His glory.
 - 4. Principles of leadership that modern Christ-followers should take from this historical leader and incorporate into life and ministry.
- Part 2 (worth 10%) The student will then present (September 9th) their historical leader to the class, briefly answering the questions above. Each student will have 15 minutes to present.
- The list of acceptable Christian leaders is as follows. Only one student will be allowed to research each leader. The leaders will be assigned on a first-come, firstserve basis (on September 5). Please feel free to seek permission to add any deceased leader that you would like to study. Requests will be examined, and approved or rejected as per the professor's inclination.

Interview with a Christian Leader - 25%

• The student will find and interview a Christian leader that they know and respect. This interview will take place during the last hour of class time on the 13th of September or sometime later that same day. The professor suggests that you get permission to record your conversation so that you can properly compile a transcript of your conversation. You will ask the required questions (listed below), and any of your own that you may be interested in asking. Please respect the time of these leaders and take no more than one hour of their time - less if possible. Each leader may only have one person asking them questions so you must first receive permission from your professor to approach them. Your professor will make a list and will know who you are approaching. Please sign up on the first day (September 5) and make your appointment with the leader well in advance of the class time assigned to this task. The student will then compile a transcript of the conversation. The student will write a summary of their interview that will be submitted with the transcript of their conversation.

Required questions:

- 1. "What is your official title and ministry that you are involved in?"
- 2. "Being in a leadership position there are many different roles and responsibilities. Can you describe some of the major roles and responsibilities that you have in your position?"
- 3. "From your experience, what does it mean to be a spiritual leader?"
- 4. "What are the main qualifications that you want to see in the life of a future spiritual leader?"
 - a. "Can anyone become a spiritual leader or is that responsibility reserved for a select few?"
 - i. "Why do you believe that?"
- 5. "What are the major or main challenges of being a spiritual leader?"

- a. "Respecting confidentiality and your comfort level, what is one of the most difficult situations that you have had been a part of as a spiritual leader?"
 - ii. How did God to use you, grow you, or teach you through that experience?
- 6. "What advice would you give to me as I pursue a leadership position in Christ's Church?"
- When you submit your transcript and summary of your interview, please include your thoughts to the following summary questions:
 - 1. What answer was the most important answer my ministry leader interviewee gave me regarding our conversation? Why?
 - 2. What was one thing that I disagreed with during my interview? Why?
 - 3. Was there a surprising or sad answer that you wanted to process further? What was it?

Leadership Through Administration Paper and Presentation - 20%

- The student will write a paper on and present a particular administrative topic. This
 paper will be academic in nature and will focus on one of the topics listed below.
 The paper will be 4-5 pages in length. The paper will be due on the 15th of
 September.
- You will write this paper as a board member of (make up a church name). You were an early member of this 5-year-old church plant. The church has a total of 135 average attendance on Sundays and 48 of those wonderful people are members. The Administrative side of the church has been neglected and needs to be addressed to facilitate further growth. You have been assigned to investigate and report on one of the topics below and present it to the church board on the 15th or 16th of September. Note, if you choose a financial administrative topic you will have to invent some numbers or use numbers from a similar sized congregation that you are familiar with.
- - 2. The Importance of <u>Topic</u> to the Continued Ministry and Success of "Bow Valley Baptist Church".
 - 3. Recommendations and Specifics to Implement at "BVBC."
- Note: This paper can be sourced entirely from one book but may also contain other sources if the student desires. The book is: Walsh, Robert. Church Administration. Nashville TN: Broadman and Holman, 2011.

- There will be a copy of *Church Administration* in the library that may <u>not</u> be checked out. This book will be in special reserve in the library. The topics listed below come directly from that book. Please do not just copy the book word-forword. The professor has read the book already and does not want a recap. Process, wrestle, and fight with the concepts within and put yourself in the shoes of a church board member or ministry leader. Wrestle with your topic and imagine how vital it would be for your church. Each topic below can only be chosen once and it will be on a first come/first serve basis.
