#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course sets out to immerse the student in the biblical narrative from Genesis to Revelation. Demonstrating the coherence of Scripture, this course will demonstrate how each book tells the story of God's redemptive acts in history. Additionally, this course will provide an introduction to the unique sections encompassed by the biblical story, creating a greater awareness of the inspiration and trustworthiness of the Bible. The student will engage in exercises that will equip them to engage with, and interpret Scripture in a meaningful way.

# **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

By the end of this course the student should be able to:

- 1. Communicate, simply and clearly, the overarching story of the Bible from the book of Genesis to the book of Revelation.
- 2. Formulate the complete order of all the biblical books, their respective sections, and appreciate the importance of divergent biblical genres.
- 3. Gain a renewed vision of the value of God's Word as a guidebook for life and grow deeper in love with God as a result.
- 4. Feel more confident in their handling of God's Word, and discerning its meaning.
- 5. Develop a general understanding for formatting and preparing a college-level paper, including references.

#### **COURSE ASSIGNMENTS**

#### Daily Quiz on Biblical Section/Book Memorization – 10%

- At the beginning of each class, students will be (sequentially) quizzed on their memorization of the divisions of the biblical canon (the 66 books of the Old and New Testaments). Students, upon receipt of the section (i.e. the Pentateuch) will be required to list all the applicable books contained within the section (i.e. Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy). Please see handout, "Periodic Table of the Bible."
- The student will be graded on two areas: identifying the right books for each section and having them in their proper order.

## DUE: 8 quizzes total, one at the beginning of each class session

### Daily Take-Home Assignment - 4 assignments, each worth 5% (20% total)

• These assignments are designed to help format papers and other academic work to NBC standards: cover pages, bibliographies, footnotes, and research tools.

DUE: September 6th, 7th, 8th, & 9th

### **Text Reading & Book Summary - 25%**

- Read The True Story of the Whole World by Bartholomew/Goheen in its entirety.
- Compose a six to seven page book summary paper that provides a chapter summary from "Prologue" to "Act 6: the Return of the King" (note: a summary should be given for each "scene"). Each chapter summary should be <u>at least half a page</u> & <u>at most a full page</u>. The student will identify what percentage of the book was read at the beginning of the paper.
- By way of a conclusion (1page), demonstrate your understanding of the biblical narrative by providing a personal reflection on how the story interacts with your own life and the implications for your story as you grow deeper in the faith, and indeed, God's story.

### **Text Reading & Reflection Paper – 20%**

- Read Before You Open Your Bible by Smethurst in its entirety.
- Compose a <u>two-page reflection paper</u> that identifies in the reflection section three-five insights you gained for how you study the Word of God at Bible college.
- Identify what percentage of the book was read at the beginning of the paper.
