COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course helps students appreciate the majesty of the gospel and equip them to live in a confident faith which expresses itself in evangelism.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

By the end of the course students will be able to...

- 1. Understand the gospel.
- 2. Appreciate the gospel and therefore be motivated to communicate the gospel with non-Christians.
- 3. Meet common objections to their faith.
- 4. Express more confidence in the truthfulness of their faith.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

Scripture Memorization - 20%

- The Bible is central in evangelism. Therefore, students are required to memorize key verses and reproduce them at the required time. Scripture can be memorized in any non-paraphrase translation.
- Scripture memorization will assess how well the students have met Course Objectives 1 and 2.

Quizzes - 20%

- The Quizzes will cover material from the textbook *Apologetics at the Cross*.
- Quizzes will assess how well students have met Course Objectives 3 and 4.

DUE: See the Course Schedule

Report - 15%

- Students will watch the video *American Gospel: Christ Crucified* and write a fourpage, double spaced review. The review should contain three elements:
 - 1. A one-page summary of the video;
 - 2. A two-page analysis of the video;
 - 3. One page containing application(s) to your life or the life of your church.
- The Report will assess how well the students have met Course Objectives 1 and 2.

DUE: October 25, 2022

Evangelism Practice - 20%

- Students will be required to deliver their gospel presentation to four different people:
 - 1. The first presentation will be done with someone else in this course.
 - 2. The second presentation will be done with one of the faculty or staff at Nipawin Bible College (cannot be the class instructor).
 - 3. The third presentation will be done with someone you do not know well in your church.
 - 4. The fourth presentation will be done with someone who is unsaved or someone whose salvation is unknown.
- For the first three practices, the person who is listening to the student's presentation will fill out a report form (see Appendix 1). For the fourth presentation, the student will fill out a self-evaluation.
- Evangelism practice will assess how well students have met Course Objectives 1 and 2.

DUE: See the Course Schedule

Exam - 25%

- The exam will cover in-class material. The student may use their Bible during the exam but have no other help.
- The Exams measure how well the students meet Course Objectives 1 and 3.

NOTE: All written assignments are to be typed in accordance with the guidelines in Kate L. Turabian's *A Manual for Writers of Research Papers, Theses, and Dissertations,* 9th ed. (Chicago, IL: The University of Chicago Press, 2018) for papers. (See NBC Sample Paper - 2022.) Assignments will be graded on the basis of content, clarity, grammar, and spelling.

Assignments will be due at the beginning of the class period on the day that they are assigned.
