COURSE DESCRIPTION

C.S. Lewis was one of the most prolific Christian writers of the 20th Century. He is known for both his theological and fictional works, and has shaped modern Christian thought extensively. This course will focus on three of Lewis' theological books and will challenge the student to think critically about their understanding of God and the Christian life, and their walk of faith.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

By the end of the course, students will...

- 1. Think critically about major theological components of the Christian faith e.g. theology, Christology, soteriology, hamartiology, and a philosophy of grief and pain.
- 2. Be able to apply this critical thinking to situations in one's life so that the heart and outward expression of one's faith might be directly impacted by intellectual growth.
- 3. Understand the impact of C.S. Lewis' writings in the 20th Century.
- 4. Grow in the confidence and ability to communicate their faith to others more effectively.
- 5. Learn how to use Christian resources such as Lewis' writings to enhance personal, daily study of God's Word.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

Class Participation - 5%

Class Participation will consist primarily of open discussion. The student is encouraged to
use the class discussion times to ask questions and clarify their understanding of what they

have read, and to benefit from the questions and perspectives of other students – while remaining attentive for the entire class.

Reading - 20%

- Students will be required to read *Mere Christianity, The Screwtape Letters,* and *The Problem of Pain*. A reading declaration will be filled out on each day the reading is due.
- This assignment will equip students to meet Course Objectives 1 to 3.

Completion of Study Guides - 25%

- The student will be required to answer the study guide questions for each of the three books assigned in this class.
- This assignment will equip students to meet Course Objectives 1 to 3.

DUE: See the Course Schedule

Major Paper - part 1 - 5%, part 2 - 5%, part 3 - 20% (30% total)

- The student will present the teacher an argument from their chosen book in the C.S. Lewis series (5%).
- The student will present an outline of their argument (5%).
- The student will write out their argument in essay format (20%). The essay must:
 - Be 8-10 pages in length.
 - Make a clear, concise argument or statement of why they agree or disagree with C.S. Lewis on their chosen topic.
 - Quote Lewis throughout using the institution standard citational method.
 - Use and apply the Bible throughout to defend their point.
- This assignment will equip students to meet Course Objectives 1 to 5.

Final Exam - 20%

• The final exam will consist of one essay question, 5 short answers, and 40 multiple choice. This exam will be based off of the readings and study guides completed throughout the semester.

NOTE: All written assignments are to be typed in accordance with the guidelines in Kate L. Turabian's *A Manual for Writers of Research Papers, Theses, and Dissertations*, 9th ed. (Chicago, IL: The University of Chicago Press, 2018) for papers. (**See NBC Sample Paper - 2022.**) Assignments will be graded on the basis of content, clarity, grammar, and spelling.

Assignments will be due at the beginning of the class period on the day that they are assigned.
