"The reality of God is revealed in the word-pictures of a parable. Jesus and the rabbis of old taught about God by using concrete illustrations that reach the heart through the imagination. They challenged the mind on the highest intellectual level by using simple stories that made common sense out of the complexities of religious faith and human experience. On the one hand, in finite terms God is beyond human comprehension, but on the other, his infinite majesty may be captured in vivid stories of daily life."

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This class is concerned with learning to experience God. One of the major ways that we can experience Him is through studying the parables that Jesus taught. The class will dive into this powerful genre of the Gospels and specifically the teachings of Jesus.

COURSE QUESTION

How do the Parables draw the reader closer to God and help the disciple move onto God's agenda?

COURSE OBJECTIVES

By the end of this course the student will:

- 1. Know the main point of most of the parables of Jesus.
- 2. Understand the unique structure and purpose of speaking in parables.
- 3. Gain confidence in explaining the parables to others.
- 4. Understand and put into practice joining God in His agenda on a daily basis.
- 5. Deepen their relationship with God.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Please note: All electronic written assignments are to be submitted in PDF or Word form. Please submit your parable assignment rough and final drafts in paper form.

Textbook Reading, Questions, Answering, and Discussion Group - 40%

- At the end of every chapter in Experiencing God there are questions to answer. Use a journal to personally answer each question from each chapter assigned for that week in detail. Then, each student will partner with 2 other students to form a "small group" for the semester. This group will take time to go through the questions weekly and discuss them together before the class that the reading is due for. Each student will then submit the form below outlining their involvement for that week's Question, Answering, and Discussion assignment.
- The student is required to read the entirety of all assigned reading. A response of
 false in their reading question will result in the loss of their Textbook Question,
 Answering, and Discussion mark for that week.

Creating a Parable (x 2) - 40%

- Each student will be responsible to craft 2 parables that will each communicate one biblical truth/principle that Jesus taught. Follow these requirements:
 - a. Your submission will first list the scripture reference that you're expounding upon with this parable. For example, (Matthew 5:3). Pick a passage in the Gospels (before January 24th for the first parable and before March 13 for the

- **second parable)** and submit this as part 1 of this assignment. It can be a single verse or a small group of verses all sharing the same main idea.
- b. The parable will use <u>modern</u> examples that will be relevant to today's cultural context. "The stage of daily life becomes the scene for viewing the world from God's perspective."²
- c. You are limited to a 400 word maximum.
- d. Your parable can be from any teaching of Jesus but it should focus on communicating one truth of God to your listeners. "Jesus used the parable to drive home his message about God and God's relationship to every human being." Your parable should have the same goal.
- e. You cannot overtly reveal the purpose of your parable within your parable. However, the meaning should be accessible through careful consideration. This is the hard part! Spend some real time on this. Much of your mark will come from how well you achieve this goal. "God enters the world of humanity with the challenge of religious conviction and corresponding action. The listener catches a glimpse of the divine character and the spiritual realities of life. Parables use rich imagery of language to catch the listener unaware. At first it all seems so familiar, and then a shift develops in the plot of the story. The ordinariness of the parable is transformed by a surprising twist. A consciousness of God and his way of viewing the world enters the commonplace scene to communicate the divine message. The familiar setting of the parable allows each person to understand God's will."⁴
- f. **Do Not** just modernize one of the existing parables of Jesus. This needs to be a unique parable of your OWN creation. In fact, if there is already a parable covering a particular verse or passage, look for something else to cover. John is a good, safe bet.
- g. Hand in a rough draft for the first parable on the due date (February 5) for evaluation and feedback. There will be no rough draft for the second parable.
- h. <u>Without</u> previously discussing your context with the person, record yourself reading your passage and then communicating your parable to 2 other people (One must be non-NBC affiliated), and ask them what they thought that the parable was trying to communicate. Ask them these questions:
 - 1. What was the main idea that my parable was trying to communicate?
 - 2. Was the parable in line with the main idea of my chosen passage?
 - 3. The main idea of my parable was ______ What parts of my parable were unnecessary to communicate that truth?
 - 4. Do you have any ideas for how I could have made the message of my parable clearer or more effective at communicating my main idea?
 - 5. Was the parable useful in helping you to think deeply about this passage from God's Word and what it is communicating?
- i. Then spend some time recording yourself (this can also be in written form if you prefer) and respond to the experience of crafting your parable. Comment on

- some of the difficulties, insights, what it was like to share your parable, and generally how the whole process when for you.
- j. Submit the recording along with your paper copy of your parable (including title page) on or before the due date <u>(February 14th for the first parable and April 3rd for the second parable)</u>.
- See the appropriate rubric for a breakdown of marks on this assignment.

Final Exam - 20%

- There will be a final exam for this class. The exam will consist of:
 - 1. Retelling the story of the parable briefly,
 - 2. Communicating the main idea behind the parable of Jesus,
 - 3. Talking about how this parable is applicable for Jesus' audience.
 - 4. Talking about how this parable is applicable for today.
- This will be an oral exam and the student will prepare to answer 2 questions that will be randomly selected at the appropriate exam time. The student can expect to get a list of the parables for the exam but they will have to fill out the main idea from their class notes.

Due: Exam Week (April 10-11)

NOTE: All written assignments are to be typed in accordance to the guidelines in Kate L. Turabian's *A Manual for Writers of Research Papers, Theses, and Dissertations,* 9th ed. (Chicago, IL: The University of Chicago Press, 2018) for papers. (See NBC Sample Paper.) Assignments will be graded on the basis of content, clarity, grammar, and spelling.

Assignments will be due at the beginning of class on the day that they are assigned.
