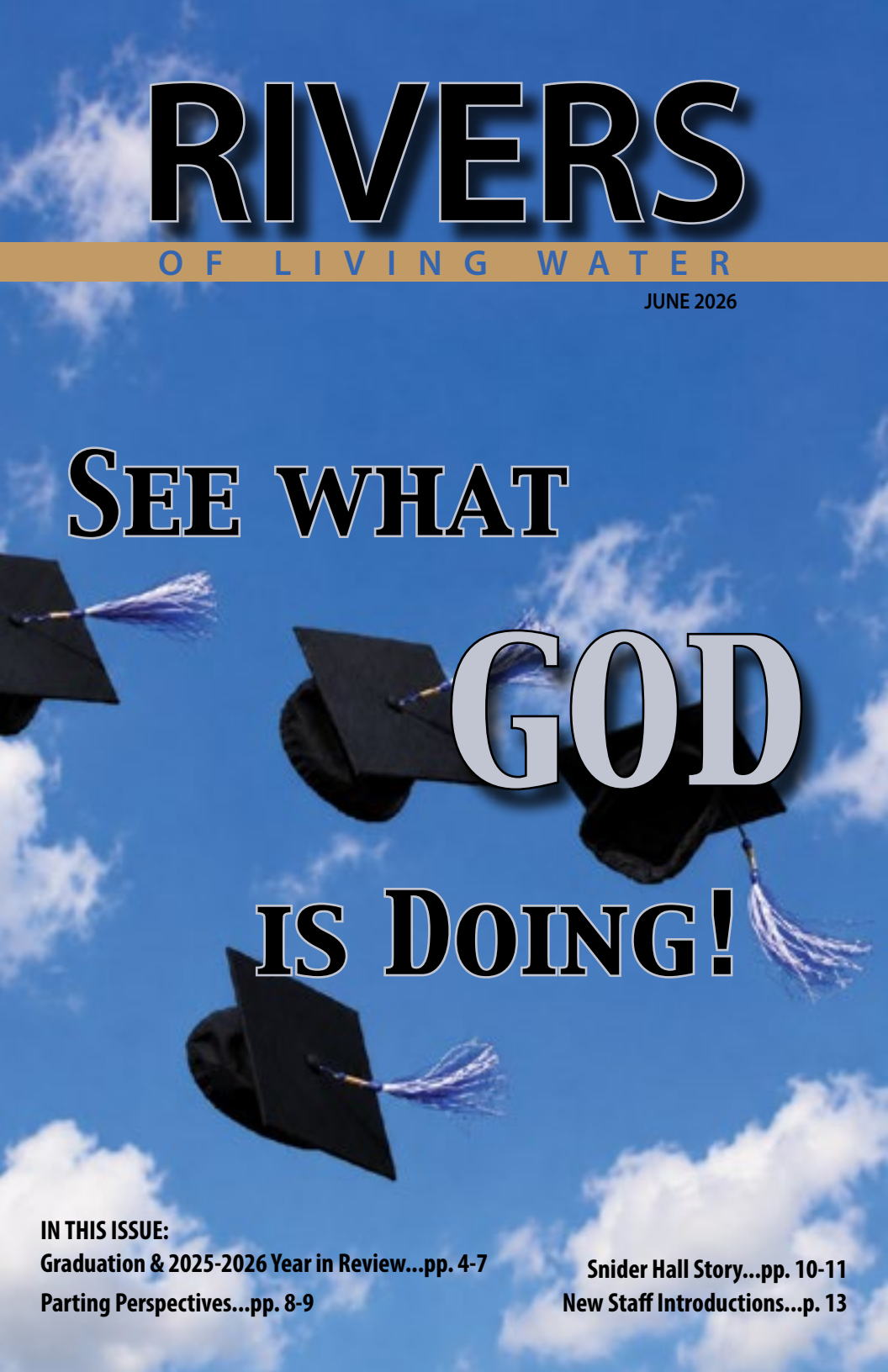

We just wrapped up our first pastors and elders retreat and conference (at least the first one in decades) here at NBC.

Thirteen different denominations were represented by those in attendance. One of my highlights was hearing everyone in attendance share their “God stories” - moments (and there were many!) where they clearly saw the Lord’s hand at work in their lives. With only 10-20 minutes for each story, I realize we just scratched the surface of the complexity of our lives and everything that God allows for the shaping of those who love Him (Rom 8:28).

Those stories of God’s work really drew us toward a place of unity as our main sessions immersed us in understanding the importance of the gospel and how we are to be growing as disciples and disciplers, additionally giving us some practical tools to consider for our lives. The gospel drew us together!

One third of those attending were alumni who had been students at Nipawin from the 1960’s through to one individual who graduated this spring. Many of their “God stories” were especially personal and touching for my heart as they recollected about places and moments on campus (as students) where the Lord incredibly impacted and changed the course of their lives: like a moment in their dorm room

“Come and see what God has done, his awesome deeds for mankind!”
(Psalm 66:5 NIV)

where God touched them in a special way or drew their heart to rest on a particular biblical truth; like a conversation with a staff member like Art Linsey, or a meeting in Jake Rempel’s office, or the impact of their local church while attending here — there were many stories and many staff and students mentioned from

years gone by right up to the present.

As I write this, I am literally sitting in the same office where men like Jake Rempel, Mark Leppington, Wes Fehr, and others have sat. What a beautiful opportunity we get at Nipawin to disciple and impact people. Just like the men here this week

shared the profound and lasting impact of their time here, I heard so many testimonies this entire current year at Nipawin Bible College — a reminder that God is still at work conforming our students more to the image of Christ and preparing them for what He has in the coming years.

No doubt many of us deeply appreciate and humbly share the names of many men and women who impacted others at Nipawin Bible College, including both staff and students. You probably don’t have to think too hard to come up with a few names. But as humans, we are merely servants, clay vessels, men and women on a continuing journey ourselves of depending on God and trusting Him to make us more like Christ as we submit our lives in obedience to His words. God desires to work through your life and



mine to impact others just as much as He worked through other’s lives to impact us. In the end, it is God’s story, not ours.

As we faithfully follow Him and keep our eyes on Him, we will have a lot of opportunity to reflect on His faithfulness. What a great God. And by His grace and mercy He uses us as vessels for His glory. This issue of the Rivers newsletter proclaims just a few of God’s awesome deeds! §

If you'd like to give toward the project, we could still use about 35K for finishing the dorm, 87K toward the septic field and about 70K left toward the underground water tank and excavation/installation. Greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus. I have the privilege of writing on behalf of my fellow

staff members who are moving on from our God-given ministry at Nipawin Bible College. It has been a beautiful 5 years of ministry for me and I wanted to write and communicate some of what I have seen God do. I would like to start by referencing 1 Corinthians 3:5-7:

What then is Apollos? And what is Paul? They are servants through whom you believed, and each has the role the Lord has given. I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So then neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth. (HCSB)

I think that it is so important to recognize that God is in the business of growing His people. He is active and wanting to work in our midst to transform lives for His glory and our good. The foundational proclamation here at NBC has been, developing passionate followers of Jesus Christ with a heart to serve. This mission statement might seem like it is our goal but it is a bit of an interesting statement because only the Lord can do what we are hoping and praying for. I have seen students come to life changing faith in a Saviour who died for them. I have seen many submit in obedience to hard callings, all for God's glory. Through it all, I was a witness to what God was doing daily in our midst.

But God was not satisfied with working in the students only! God has a way of not leaving people where they are at but continually encouraging them to move forward and to go deeper in relationship with Him and with His people. As a staff team we continually focused on loving God as individuals and as a team. The unity that we enjoyed grew and was a noticeable blessing to me as I worked throughout my time at NBC. Starting off every day in prayer was especially rich as we dedicated each day to the One we serve and love. God showed up in our midst as we turned our lives back over to Him as a daily discipline. I believe that the heart of it all was a recognition that NBC is His school and we are His people whose mission is to fulfill His great commandment to love God and others.

I have loved watching God transform these young lives for His glory right before my eyes. 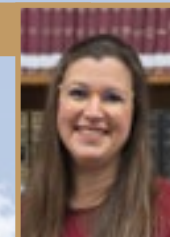


Marla Bueckert

THE SNIDER HALL STORY

Snider Hall and Baxter Hall! Who were these people and why are their names attached to the dorms at Nipawin Bible College? Their story is one that helped shape NBC, and one that spread from rural Saskatchewan to four continents over four generations.

Roy and Ethel Snider were farmers who moved from Alberta to Saskatchewan in 1921 in search of better land. They settled in the Carlea area, about 30 km southeast of Nipawin. Although they had both been raised in Christian homes, up until this time the Bible and church had little to do with their everyday life. That changed in Carlea, thanks to a praying neighbour!



With a renewed faith, Roy helped start a Sunday school. He became the Bible teacher and joined the cause of starting more Sunday schools in the area. He and Ethel hosted a variety of itinerant preachers who came through the area.

Several leaders in the area were interested in a Bible school. They decided on a piece of property about 2.5 miles south of Carlea, where the Leather River joins the Carrot River and, in 1934, Two Rivers Bible Institute was founded. Several years later, the Bible school asked Roy to take charge of its agricultural work and so, in 1945, Roy

and Ethel moved their family and all their implements to the campus. The livestock and huge garden supplied food for the high school and Bible school students. And their large family supplied students for both the high school and Bible school!

Unfortunately, being situated between two rivers, the school was susceptible to spring flooding. Finally, in 1957, after several damaging floods, it was clear that the school had to relocate and Roy took an active part in finding property in Nipawin. The Sniders also moved to Nipawin where Roy and Ethel retired and continued to promote the Bible school. They loved to attend the annual conferences and reunite with old friends.

They both spent their last years in Pineview Lodge in Nipawin. Roy passed in 1979 and Ethel in 1983. After their passing and in honour of their dedication to the Bible school, their daughters established an annual bursary to be awarded to a student anticipating a missionary career. At the school's 75th anniversary celebration in 2009, the women's residence was named Snider Hall because of Roy and Ethel's involvement in the development of the college.

Of their twelve adult children, several attended the high school connected with TRBI, seven graduated from TRBI, five went as missionaries to other countries, one served as a pastor's wife in Canada and many were faithful in their local churches.

Bert, Roy and Ethel's oldest, was the first graduate of TRBI in 1936. He went

to Columbia where he met and married another missionary, Katherine Klassen.

Neoma graduated from TRBI in 1939 and went to Haiti where she served as a nurse's aid with Unevangelized Fields Mission for 35 years.

Cora graduated from TRBI in 1941. She went to the Dominican Republic under the West Indies Mission where she practised maternity nursing.

Robert (Bob) graduated from TRBI in 1942 and married Helen Salisbury from Tisdale. He was active in their local church in Tisdale, often teaching Bible classes and serving on the board.

Blanche graduated from TRBI in 1948 while simultaneously teaching high school there. She nursed in Chad and Uganda until her return to Nipawin in 1966 and subsequent marriage to LeRoy Hitchcock.

Leland (Le) graduated from TRBI in 1950. He and his wife, Marjorie Nygaard, met at TRBI, and served one term in Nigeria.

Le's son, **Keith**, was born in Nigeria and, as an adult, worked with his wife, Ruth Fredlund, as missionaries with Wycliffe Bible Translators in Ghana.

Keith's son, **Jeff**, and his wife Danielle were missionaries in Bangladesh for five years. They were the third generation of missionaries in their branch of the family.

Ethel graduated from TRBI and married George Baxter, whose parents, Max and Pearl Baxter, were on staff there. Thus the Snider and Baxter families were joined because of TRBI and live on through the

names of the women's and men's dorms on the current campus. George and Ethel pastored in Regina, Calgary, Vancouver and again in Regina.

A big book could be written about the experiences of each of these people in their very diverse countries, but Keith summed it up well when he said, "My generation has an incredible legacy, thanks in no small part to what is now Nipawin Bible College. I say this to encourage you that the seeds you are sowing now will bear fruit for years to come. Never lose sight of the big picture."

If Roy and Ethel could look back on their lives today, decades later, I'm sure they, too, would tell us that God will produce fruit for our labours, whether we live an "ordinary" family life, pray in solitude, serve in the local church or work in far away places. We may never see that fruit, but what matters is that we are faithful to what God has called us. S

The last of Roy and Ethel's children, Dean, is now 91 years old. He lives with his wife, Lillian, in a care home in Penticton, BC.

We have chosen our theme for Obah Night! Come on out in your most

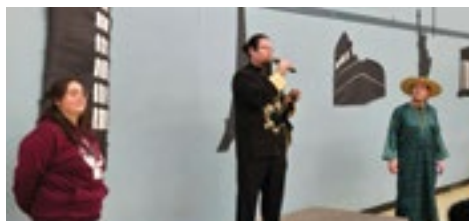
80s outfit. A decade farther back than we care to admit.
